2022 Annual Report for Eagle River United Methodist Camp

(Part of the Outdoor Ministries of the Alaska United Methodist Conference)

Community Use and other Camp Rentals:

The Camp was once again used by the Juneau Community for Camps and Cabin Rentals. Camp users include the School District, Lynn Canal Adventures, Boy and Girl Scouts, Christ Community Church for their annual Men's and Women's Retreats, UAS, AK Outdoor Science, Tlingit and Haida CC, individual families, and many others. Now in its third year of the Covid pandemic we did see the rentals of our facilities coming back to more normal levels.

Finances:

The camp's finances are relatively healthy, we are fortunate to have a strong cash position and as of December 8, 2022, we had total revenues of \$62,769, and total Expenses of \$66,281, with a net operating loss for 2022 of \$3,500, mostly due to higher fuel cost and an increase in employee compensation.

Programs:

- This year we restarted the Discovery Camp on a limited scale(19 campers).
- There was no Camp Champ as we planned to participate in the CDF Freedom School – Children's Defense Fund which was a coordinated effort between <u>K</u>unéix Hídi Northern Light United Church(KHNLUC) and ERUMC and was attended by 30 scholars. Unfortunately the last week of residential camp was switched from ERUMC to KHNLUC for logistical reasons and because the ERUMC Camp dean had backed out.

Facilities:

The <u>Treat Cabin</u> went through a significant upgrade. It had its moldy, broken down bathroom totally ripped out. A small pony wall was built to frame a cozy corner. The cabin was upgraded with a new sheetrock ceiling; a new overhead light; a fresh coat of paint; a new laminate floor; new propane hot plate; a new exhaust vent; and all these changes were rounded out by a couple new pieces of furniture and a new bed quilt. It looks very nice and deserves a big shout out to the many volunteers that worked to make it happen. Thank you.

The <u>Maier Cabin roof</u> was replaced and funded by the Akiyama family – Thanks!! The old rusty corrugated metal roof and layers of tar paper were stripped off. The few pieces of rotten plywood were replaced. Rotten facia was replaced on the North roof edge and new bird block installed. Then a new layer of Grace Ice/Water shield underlayment was put down and new metal roofing, flashing, and drip edge installed. It looks great and should last several decades.

The main <u>Camp Entry Welcome</u> sign: This summer two new gate poles with a big colorful Welcome sign were installed which catches your eye as you drive by.

The <u>Lodge Kitchen stoves</u>: Two new kitchen stoves were installed and replaced some tired stoves that were long overdue to be replaced. The old stoves were hauled off to the metal recycling.

In terms of our efforts to improve our facilities we are looking forward to the next "big" projects in 2023, which are the re-plumbing of the Lodge's water supply and the drains for the dish washing sinks, as well as the installation of a water softener in the lodge to treat the water.

Following that will be the remodel of the bathhouse with its own water softener, new sinks, toilets, and partitions. The theory being that the water softener will remove the iron in the water and prevent the rust staining we suffer currently.

All these improvements look very nice and deserve a big shout out to the many volunteers that worked to make it happen.

Other:

Camp-Get-Ready – May 14 saw 20 volunteers come out and complete many projects to give the camp a face lift and get it ready for the summer.

Chop-A-Thon -- October 22; 16 volunteers came out and filled the woodshed for the next year.

Thanksgiving Community Event – November 24; led by Jane Ginter and Bob Coghill; 30+ people attended.



CONGREGATIONAL GIVING AND MATCH IN 2022 GROW PERMANENT ENDOWMENT FUNDS BY 57 PERCENT!

Thank you to those who have contributed to the K□unéix□ Hídi Northern Light United Church Permanent Endowment Funds!

And, **THANKS** to the Alan and Mana Akiyama family for matching, dollar to dollar, all contributions received between January 1 and November 30, 2022!



In total, 2022 Contributions to the two Permanent Endowment funds equaled \$33,765. \$20,710 was given to the Programmatic Permanent Endowment Fund and \$13,055 to the Capital Permanent Endowment Fund.

With the additional giving of 2022, total giving to the Programmatic Endowment Fund now equals \$53,016 and the Capital Endowment Fund now equals \$39,916. The combined total for the two funds is 57% greater than at the start of 2022.

The two Permanent Endowment Funds are named "Permanent" because they are managed so as to always equal at least the amount initially contributed to each fund (even after adjusted for inflation). As a result of such management, when the funds begin to be used, they will have the capacity to provide that funding level for as long as needed, even if such need might extend for decades!

Fund-raising for the Permanent Endowment Funds continues in 2023. Any amount an individual or family wishes to contribute will be gratefully received. Gifts to the Permanent Endowment Funds can be given either immediately or pledged to be given sometime in the future.
