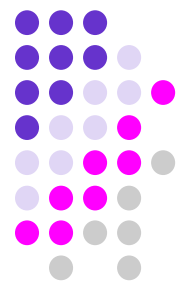

OUR NEW PASTOR HEADS FOR JUNEAU!



Kunéix Hídi Northern Light United Church's new pastor, Charles Ensminger, and his wife, Cindy, begin their month-long drive to Juneau from eastern Tennessee on Saturday, June 3. Accompanying the Ensmingers are their dog (Whiskey) and two cats (Echo and Ju-

piter). None of the travelers have ever been to Alaska.

Their itinerary will take them, among other places, to the South Dakota Badlands, Yellowstone National Park, and Glacier National Park. During their northwestern trek they will also visit family and friends. At some point they will connect with the Alaskan Highway and travel to Skagway before catching a ferry to Juneau, arriving here on July 1.

Both Charles and Cindy are intrigued by "northern lights" and wildlife – which they eagerly want to experi-

ence. They both like to hike. They also value getting to know different areas and cultures and want to come to Juneau for both of those reasons.

Charles' first Sunday leading Kunéix Hídi's worship service will be July 9. Before then, he and Cindy hope to quickly unpack their personal effects into the manse, where they will live.

In a telephone conversation Charles stated, "I am excited at the opportunity offered me and want to get to know the communities of Juneau and Kunéix Hídi."

Keeping KHNLUC a Safe Place

An essential tenet of the Christian faith is the inherent value and sacred worth of each person. KHNLUC is a More Light and Reconciling Church. “No matter who you are or where you are on life’s journey, you are welcome here.”

Our Christian faith calls us to offer hospitality and community to all and to protect our children, youth and other vulnerable people from exploitation and abuse.

The Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) is encouraging KHNLUC members to learn about ways all of us can help keep our church a safe place for everyone. The church is offering an on-line training course designed to help all of us keep our church safe. The training is free to all members and regular attendees of KHNLUC. Permission for a background check can also be given through this system called Ministry Safe. The background check will be online and accessible only to the Pastor and Church Administrator. The background check looks for documented crimes of violence. The church

covers the cost of the training and background check. Completing this training and the background check will increase the number of volunteers who can work with children and vulnerable adults.

If you are willing to complete the training, which takes less than an hour of your time schedule in your home, and provide information for a background check, call Christina in the church office and she will email you the training link. The program, Ministry Safe, has been used by the Alaska Methodist Conference for a number of years.

SPRC encourages you to assist with another part of our effort to ensure a safe environment in our church by taking time to read *KHNLUC Safe Sanctuary Policies*. We will be highlighting these policies in the next several newsletters. ***The following information is from our revised policy.***

“A. Rule of Three

1. For any ministry or activity in which children, youth or vulnerable adults par-

ticipate, every effort will be made to have two unrelated adult leaders, employees or volunteers present. We recognize that the unexpected may happen.

- a. Overnight activities involving children, youth or vulnerable adults of multiple sexes should have adult leaders of multiple sexes present.
2. If a child or vulnerable adult requires toileting assistance, two adults should be provided. Toileting assistance for a vulnerable adult should be provided by a person of the same sex. It is permissible for one adult to stand by the open door of the restroom if there is not room or the second adult is of a different sex.
3. An adult leader will not transport a single child, youth or vulnerable adult alone.
 - a. The “rule of three” does not apply to youth over the age of 16 who are trans-

- porting themselves, members of their family or other youth to church activities.
4. At least two adult leaders should stay at the church activity until all the participants have gone.
 5. For events and activities involving children and youth, there should be at least five years age difference between the oldest youth participant and at least one adult present. Children and youth should not be left under the sole supervision of a person under the age of 18 absent parental or guardian consent. (We acknowledge that unexpected issues arise.)”

May Council Meeting Prepares for Summer Transitions and Schedules

The Church Council met on May 9, in hybrid form. At the meeting the Council, among other things:

- Adopted a new logo for Kunéix Hídi NLUC
- Appointed Council members Maxine Richert and Linda McCargar, as Council representatives to, respectively, the Nominating Committee and the Healing Task Force.
- Received updates on a planned visit (now likely be August 27 – September 1, 2023) to Juneau by the PC (USA) national advance team preparing for the formal apology of the closure of the Memorial Presbyterian Church in 1962. Schedules allowing, the formal apology will be October 7-9, 2023.
- Approved the employment contract for our new pastor, Charles Ensminger.
- Planned to host the Pacific Northwest United Methodist Cabinet meeting at Kunéix Hídi on May 19, followed by the ordination of its new Bishop (Cedric Bridgeforth) at Aldersgate United Methodist Church on May 20.
- Re-affirmed the start of the Summer Worship Schedule (service begins at 10 AM) to be June 4
- Announced the Church and neighborhood (potluck) Block Party to be on June 11, immediately following the worship service
- Scheduled pastor Laura Krauss's farewell celebration to be on June 25.

of the year recommended by Smithsonian Magazine.

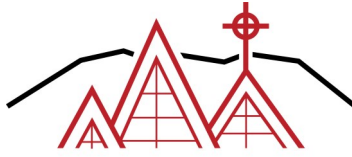

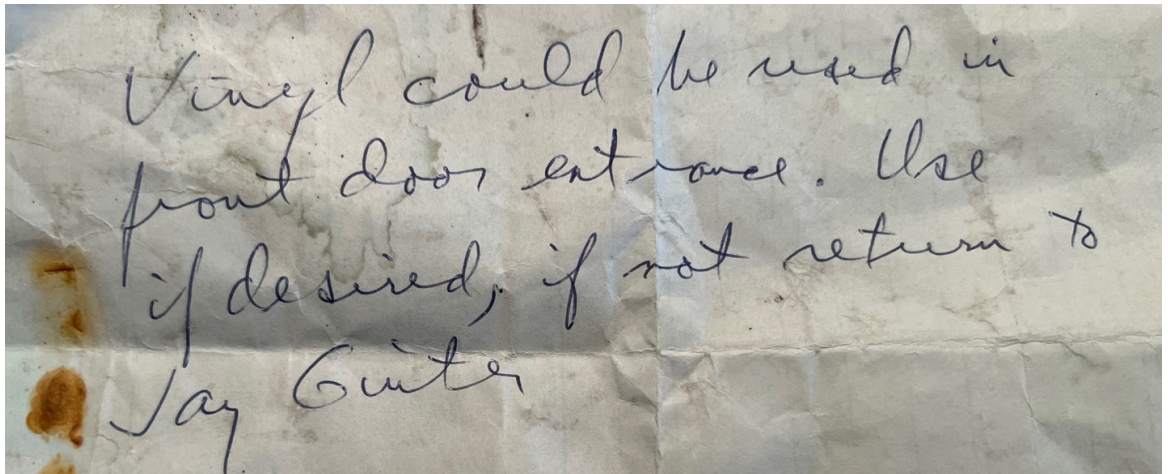
Many Years of Working on Manse

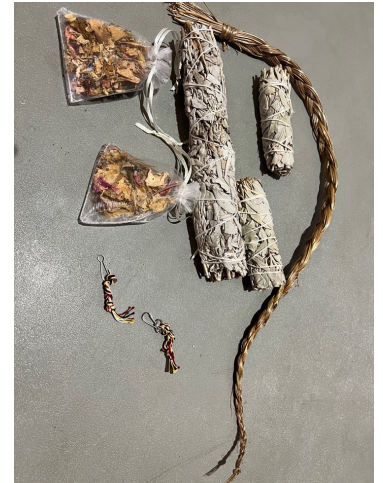

GNC Cabinet and Veterans march for peace, nuclear disarmament

JUNEAU – While in Alaska for the installation service of Bishop Cedrick D. Bridgeforth, members of the Greater Northwest Area cabinet had the chance to meet and march with individuals seeking peace and care for creation in the Arctic.

On Sunday, cabinet members and guests heard a presentation from Veterans for

Peace, who are actively working to prevent nuclear activity in the arctic and have lobbied the Alaska legislature as well as the federal government for recognition of an updated nuclear test ban treaty that would make the arctic to the north of Alaska a nuclear-free zone as well.

“It’s an uphill battle,” said Craig Wilson, president of the local chapter of Veterans for Peace. “Given the fact we are getting more nuclear weapons (in the world) we feel this is important.”

Bishop Bridgeforth agrees with the need for action.

[In an interview with KINY News of the North](#), Bridgeforth – a U.S. Air Force Veteran – spoke of the common cause between the Veterans for Peace and The United Methodist Church: peace and care for creation.

“I believe that many of those who served within our armed forces are there for issues and efforts of peace, not for war-making. It’s really about peacekeeping, not about war-making,” Bridgeforth said.

In addition to learning about the Arctic, cabinet members were also trained in some of the practices of non-violent, direct action by Rev. Osagyefo Sekou of Val-

ley and Mountain UMC in Seattle. While Sekou serves as pastor of theology and arts in Seattle, he has a national reputation for non-violent, militant protest training and has been part of community protests in places like Ferguson, Missouri, and Charlottesville when racial violence erupted. Rev. Kristi McGuire, pastor at Aldersgate UMC in Juneau, was one of Sekou’s students and she invited him to come lead a training workshop with the veterans’ group as well as with GNW leadership.

“We are called to be

stewards of creation,” McGuire said. “We want to create some visibility for this.”

Sekou was clear with Sunday’s group that he was training them for the worst-case scenarios in protest movements. What the group would be doing on Monday was not a worst-case scenario. Nevertheless, he had the group scooting, sitting, standing, linking arms and ducking for cover while reminding them they do this out of “deep abiding love.”

Their efforts gained attention on Monday as

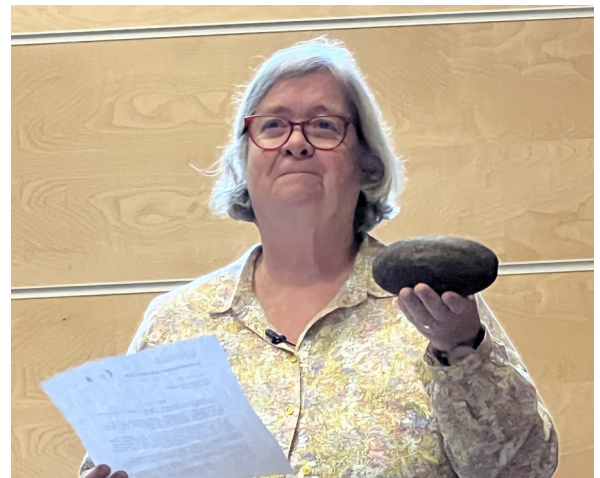
they walked solemnly across the Juneau-Douglas bridge – many in their clerical robes – into downtown Juneau carrying signs like “United Methodists for Peace” and “No Nukes in the Arctic.”

They received honks and waves as they walked to the Whale Project park on the banks of the Gastineau Channel. Once there, they prayed, lamented, lit candles, sang and prayed more.

Faith and An Arctic Free of Nuclear Weapons



Not since the height of the Cold War has the threat of using nuclear weapons been as great as it is today.

An Alaskan state-wide voter initiative is proposed for 2026 to direct our State Government to advocate, nationally and internationally, for the Arctic to be declared a Nuclear Weapons Free Zone (NWFZ).

To create support for this important initiative a coalition of faith groups is an essential component. That effort received a “jump-start” with the installation of Resident Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth of the Greater Pacific Northwest Area at Juneau’s Aldersgate UMC

on May 20.

Bishop Bridgeforth stated The Greater Northwest Area’s 2023 Annual Conference theme, “Go and Do Likewise,” was central, with Jesus’ words providing both challenge and direction. The bishop encouraged United Methodists across the Greater Northwest to “pray with our feet ...”

The following day a learning session and dialog on the new and evolving threats of nuclear weapons, but also the opportunity to work towards a Nuclear Weapons Free Arctic was provided for the Bishop and his staff. A peaceful march Monday Morning across the Juneau Douglas Bridge

was a public statement advocating for an Arctic NWFZ. At the end of the march an “ask” by Aldersgate Pastor Kristy McGuire to the Bishop for his Area’s support that could serve as a major step in building a coalition of faith communities working towards a more peaceful world.
