The work of the church is never easy, nor is it ever finished. The work of the church is love. Easy to say, but not always the clearest idea to live out. As I arrive here in Juneau and, more particularly, to Kunéix Hídi Northern Light United Church, I arrive into a community that has been and is (and will continue to) do the hard work of love. I am overwhelmed by that work, and thrilled to be a part of it!

I wish to share a story that, in my opinion, can be something of an ideal for us as we strive to reach out in the love of God and in the name of Christ.

In 2008, I was part of a group that traveled to Egypt and Israel on a study tour. A wonderful experience, to say the least. Among the sights we saw and the places we visited, there was a moment that caught me completely by surprise. It took place in the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem. As I walked through, stopping to admire one of the windows in the Roman Catholic sanctuary (there is also a Greek Orthodox sanctuary in an adjacent building) I met a woman named Margot. She was sitting in a pew in the Roman Catholic sanctuary wearing a bright yellow raincoat.

Our group had just emerged from the caves beneath the church into the sanctuary, which was bright, even on an overcast, rainy day as that one was. We milled about, cameras clicking and my ever-present video camera rolling away. But after a few minutes of filming, I found that I just wanted to take a few moments and just *look* at the church. spending a few moments standing in contemplation, I turned to leave by way of the center aisle.

It was then that this woman, who had been there the whole time, held up her hand to stop me.

“Where are you from?” came the question.

“The United States,” I answered. “And you?” I asked in return.

“From here.” She smiled and extended her hand towards me. I took her hand and shook it and found that she didn’t seem disposed to let me go. She pulled my hand closer and covered it with her left hand.

Still looking at me, she asked why we were at the church.

“We are a group that is here on a Biblical study tour.” Her eyes opened a little larger.

“Then you are Christian?” she asked.

“Yes.”

“That is so good that you are here. This is a beautiful place. It is good that you don’t rush through. I saw you looking at the windows. Aren’t they beautiful?” I answered that they were indeed. And from that initial conversation, we began to have a rather deep conversation about belief and faith, with Margot not letting go of my hand. I knelt beside her, her in the pew and me still in the center aisle.

It was, in my experience, what I would call a spiritual, even existential moment. It was a moment when everything around us seemed to be a

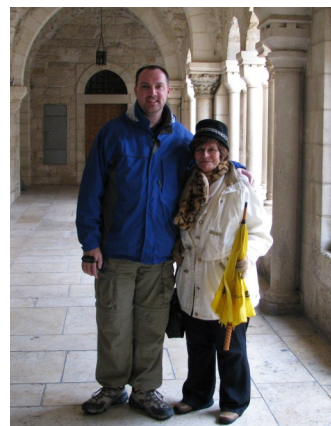
world away. We were caught up in a great conversation.

Roman Catholic might be a designation we would place upon her. Perhaps Palestinian Christian. Me? United Methodist. Protestant. American. There are a lot of issues that could have separated us, with a lot more that the world could use to divide us even further. But she concluded our conversation by saying this:

“I am here because of God. You are here because of God. We are here together because we believe in God. That makes us the same. We are brother and sister.” She reached up and hugged me and patted me on my right cheek.

About twenty minutes later, as we were preparing to leave, I saw Margot again, also headed out of the church. I had my wife Cindy take our picture. And despite all the inherited differences that Margot and I might have, I also know that I have a sister in Christ that lives in Bethlehem. And, truth be told, so do you.

Finance and Investments News

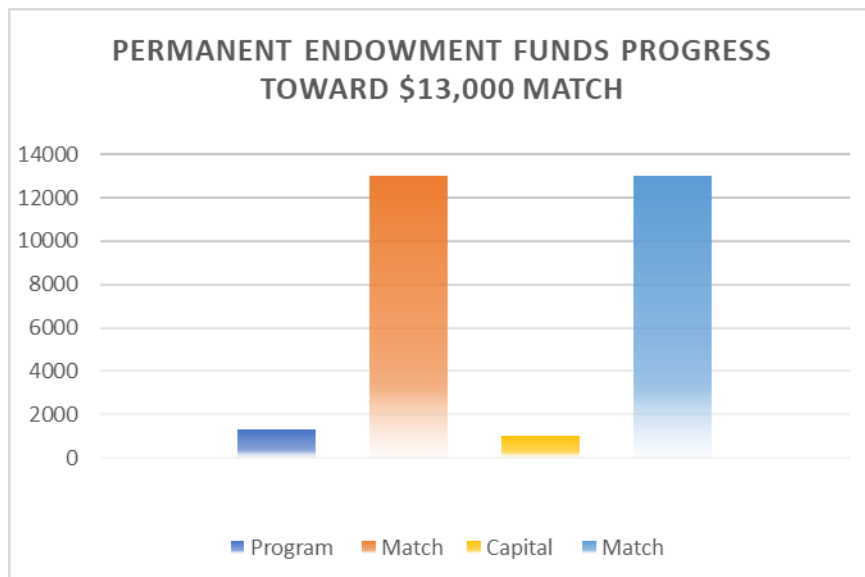
General Fund Donations and Expenses – As of July 24, the offerings to the general operating fund of KHNLUC are about the same as they were on the same date in 2023. They are running about \$20,000 behind the budgeted amount for this time of year. The general fund expenses are right on track with the budgeted amount. If you are making a donation from an IRA or donor advised account, please consider giving no later than early November to ensure that the church receives your donation before the end of the calendar year.

Food Security Fund Donations – Donations to the Food Security Fund help fund meals for the summer lunch program, the weekend food bags, the Glory Hall, and Family Promise. Donations to date are about \$2000 less than last year this time and about \$1000 less than current expenses. Please consider an additional donation to this fund this summer.

Matching Opportunity for the Permanent Endowment Funds – The congregation approved two permanent endowment funds in 2021. One fund is for programs and the other is for capital projects. The Akiyama's have generously matched donations since 2021 and are offering to match donations in 2023 of up to \$13,000 for each fund. The chart below shows the progress toward this match. Please consider donating to one or both of these funds this year. To meet the match, donations must be received by November 30, 2023.

Special events in the coming months include the apology service on Sunday October 8, All Saints Sunday (November 1), and Walter Soboleff Sunday (November 12). A special service will be held on Tuesday, August 29, at 5:00 PM for the advance team from the national PCUSA and NW Coast Presbytery who will be here planning for the apology in October. July Council Meeting Focuses on Future Events

At its July 13 meeting, Council members welcomed Pastor Charles Ensminger to Juneau and K̄unéix̄ Hídi Northern Light United Church.

In his initial report to the Council Pastor Charles thanked the congregation for the warm welcome he and Cindy have received since their arrival and indicated that his first priorities include

- ◆ preparing, in conjunction with the Worship Committee, for the holiday season, following the reparative apologies of early October; and
- ◆ in the new year developing, with the Worship Committee and congregation, a process by which we (K̄unéix̄ Hídi Northern Light United Church) will formulate a fresh definition of ourselves, as “church”.

Midyear financials presented to the Council show that although we are halfway through the year, our annual revenue has only amounted to 42% of its budgeted amount.

It was reported that the Healing Task Force’s weekly meetings are pulling together myriad details for the 6- or 7-person Presbyterian Advance Team’s time in Juneau between August 27 and September 1. Those details include lining up speakers and providing quality time with local representatives and others, including the Soboleff family. The ultimate goal is for the Advance Team to have as comprehensive an understanding as possible of the impacts of the arbitrary and racist closing of the Memorial Presbyterian church in 1962; and how to most meaningfully and effectively offer apologies and reparations for that closing. It is hoped that representatives from many small, Southeast villages with current or past Presbyterian churches will be in Juneau to also meet with the Advance Team and give them insights and advice as to how to establish a reparative scholarship program for prospective village ministers/leaders.

As the result of an extended discussion regarding the Deacons work on designing proposed new coffee cups for the Fellowship Hall, the Council decided to ask the Native Ministries Committee for its thoughts about an appropriate translation of “K̄unéix̄ Hídi” if such a translation was placed on the new cups.

Following another extended discussion, this time concerning the Church’s need for a new street sign, Council asked the Committee on Property Management to research the type, content, and costs of various sign options and report back to the Council.

The Council referred the hiring of a person to provide child-care during Sunday morning worship service to the SPRC for their consideration and advice.

Acknowledgement, Apology, and Reparations

We continue our planning for delegates of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and Northwest Coast Presbytery to join us in planning for formal acknowledgement and apology for the racist closure of the Memorial Presbyterian Church in 1963. I had intended today to write about the events to be held, the meals to be prepared and all the other arrangements that are needed. And I will do that.

However, before we go there, I would like to respond to a question I received after church last Sunday. Repeating the question is not important, but I am grateful for its thoughtfulness and for the reminder that we have moved so far into planning that we have neglected to continue the conversation about “why we are doing this.”

The overture certainly is about owning the shameful decisions that were made to remove Dr. Walter Soboleff from the pulpit in the Memorial Presbyterian Church, to eliminate financial support for, and ultimately close that church, and for the callous way in which this occurred. The pain of those events resonated with Dr. Soboleff throughout the remainder of his life, and continues to reverberate in his family, and among the former members of the Memorial Presbyterian Church and all of their descendants. The effects spread to all the Alaska Native churches of Southeast Alaska as his powerful voice of advocacy in the capitol of Alaska was muffled.

The overture, though, goes beyond the words of acknowledgment and apology. The apologies in October are not an end: they are a new beginning. When our congregation overwhelmingly approved our resolution of reparation and made the overture to the Presbytery and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA), we did so with an understanding that apology without action is wholly insufficient. Repentance is the essential core of apology and is incomplete without the pursuit of change.

We committed, as did the Presbytery and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA), to work to make meaningful change. We committed to take on the work of not one lifetime but of many lifetimes. This includes the work to support the life of churches of Alaska Natives and other people of color; to support the aspirations of young Indigenous people; to encourage and help support protection of and revitalization of Tlingit and other Native languages; to recognize and support the traditional values and culture of Tlingit and other Indigenous peoples; to develop and enhance models of engagement and accountability for interactions so the difficult decisions about support and funding are made in a spirit that rejects any bias in favor of predominantly white points of view.

All these commitments, and more, are set out in our resolution of reparations and in the overture itself. These are available on our web page. I urge each of you to read and reflect upon them. All this work is in the aid of eliminating conscious and unconscious bias and racism. All of this is in the aid of ensuring that we are truly welcoming to all, not only within the walls of our church, but everywhere in our community and our country and the world. This is truly the work of many lifetimes, and truly the work we have committed to as we try to live the life and lessons of Jesus.

As we reflect on this, we also need to be sure that everyone is fed, housed, able to access our services and meetings, and that our church is welcoming (and clean and tidy). Our Deacons have taken on helping with this and they will be reaching out to everyone for help. You are urged to contact Kristi Peel, Melody Millard, Janet Kussart, and Susan Bus and watch for sign-up sheets.
