Plunged into Darkness in Order to See

The theologian Paul Tillich once described experiencing God as being akin to a sudden flash of lightning. For a moment, everything is illuminated – even *hyper*-illuminated, by that meaning that suddenly things are clearer than they would be even in normal circumstances. And in this moment of clarity, we are able to see clearly all that is around us. (This can be found in Paul Tillich's book *The Shaking of the Foundations* (New York: Scribners Press, 1948).

However, as the moment passes, we are once again plunged into darkness. The difference being that because of the flash of light, the darkness appears to be that much greater. Tillich would argue that this is the awareness of estrangement from God - sin. When we are in the presence of God, we are suddenly made all too aware of our shortcomings.

What we are also made aware of is grace. In the presence of God we recognize our sins, but we also recognize the grace of God that is *more* abundant than our sins. As the hymn sings, "Grace, grace, God's grace. Grace that is greater than all our sins." As Tillich wrote, "Grace transforms fate into a meaningful destiny; it changes guilt into confidence and courage. There is something triumphant in the word "grace": in spite of the abounding of sin, grace abounds much more." (Tillich p. 156.)

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Sermons for September

For the month of September, I want to draw your attention to some theological ideas and concepts that might make us a bit uncomfortable. This has to do with the weight of the subject matter more than anything else. The inspiration for these sermons came from reading the book *Insur*rection (Howard Books, 2011) by Peter Rollins.

Sometimes, though, it takes a moment of deep darkness to appreciate the light. The lightning which provides us with the hyper-illumination then plunges us into what *appears* to be a deeper darkness. What we come to realize is that the darkness is no deeper. It is as dark as it was *before* the lightning. Yet the lightning has made us keenly aware of the absence of light. Yet as we regain our bearings, we begin to realize that even in the darkness, we can still see. There is still light, and that light (keeping with the metaphor) is the presence of God still with us.

Singer and songwriter Paul Thorn has a song called "I Hope I'm Doing This Right." In it he sings these words, "Hank Williams was in the darkness/ when he sang 'I saw the light'/ I believe there's good in everyone/ I hope I'm doing this right. The more I learn, the less I know/ The more I change the more I grow/ I pray the road I'm traveling on will lead me to the light/ God, I hope I'm doing this right."

Sometimes it is the flash of lightning that makes us aware of our sins, but if that's all we are aware of, then we miss the larger illumination: God's grace abounds. We are not struck dead in the light, we are made aware of our estrangement from God, but we are also made aware that God's grace is greater still. We find that we can see a little more clearly in the darkness, and as such we can take tentative steps forward towards newness of life.

Be A Greeter!

Serving as a greeter at Kunéix Hídi Northern Light United Church is a rewarding ministry.

The first line of ministry takes place with greeters.

Many of us were ourselves newcomers at one point. Do you remember who greeted you and made you feel welcome?

Every Sunday morning, we have the opportunity to welcome members, friends, and visitors as they arrive for worship. Please help us be a welcoming church and consider lending us your smile to greet worshipers each Sunday.

Here's our current instructions for serving as a greeter:

The usher arrives one-half hour before service is scheduled to begin (9:30 AM for Summer Worship, June 4 - Sept 3, 10:30 AM after September 3).

The usher should:

Welcome worshipers, especially those who appear to be new to KHNLUC. Mention to people with children that there are crayons, coloring books, and books available.

We no longer require a mask, but if they would like one, offer them a mask.

If they are visitors, ask them to sign the sign-in sheet near the sanctuary doors, making sure they include their phone/email. There is also a "check-off" sheet with names of regular worshipers. If the usher knows those attending, please check off their names. We are working through the best ways to keep attendance. Let us know your opinion!

Provide a bulletin.

The usher should remain towards the back of the church during the service to assist late arrivals.

During Joys & Concerns, the usher will pick up the microphone from the back, making sure it is turned ON, and take it to those who wish to speak.

The Worship Leader or the usher will read Joys & Concerns from Zoom Chat. Those on Zoom will be asked if they want to unmute and speak.

The usher will ask someone to assist with taking the offering. Walk

up the center aisle to the front of the congregation, then pass offering plates to the rows. Finish at the rear of the church.

The usher will combine the offering plates and wait until the beginning of the Offering Response (Doxology). Walk up and place the offering plates on the altar.

During Announcements or Opportunities for Serving and Growing the usher will make the microphone available for those who wish to speak.

It is helpful if the usher can remain near the rear of the church for anyone who leaves the service early to thank them for coming.

We encourage the congregation to remain seated during the postlude.

After the service, the offering plates should be taken into the office for the counters. If the offering is not being counted that Sunday, put all the money in the blue lockbox in the office behind the office door. The blue lockbox is under the box on the wall where all the keys are kept.

August Council Meeting Focuses on Advance Team Visit to Juneau

At its August 10 meeting, the Church Council directed most of its attention to the upcoming Advance Team Visit (August 28 - September 1) regarding the planned, formal apology and offer of reparations for the unjust closure of the Memorial Presbyterian Church in 1962-3. The formal apology will be offered on Indigenous Peoples' Day, October 8.

During the meeting the Council:

- ◆Approved a revised version of the Kunéix Hídi NLUC Personnel Policies and Procedures
- ♦ Discussed various security issues related to the Church building and church-related events.
- ◆ Authorized a contract for facilitation and leading of the program for the above-referenced August 28-September 1 Advance-Team visit to Juneau.
- ◆Authorized the creation of a temporary sign designating the fellowship hall as the Reverend Doctor Walter Soboleff Memorial Hall
- ◆Authorized covering travel costs of representatives from various Southeast Alaska communities to come to Juneau to meet with Advance-Team representatives to identify various ways to strengthen and support church ministry efforts in Southeast Alaska
- ◆ Authorized the placement of a temporary sign at the downtown Juneau Firehall documenting the unjust closure of the Memorial Presbyterian Church in 1962.
- ◆ Authorized the employment of videographers to prepare a high quality, complete audio/video record of the August 28 September 1 Advance-Team visit to Juneau (to be reimbursed by the Presbyterian Church (USA)
- ◆ Authorized the issuance of a formal apology, on behalf of KHNLUC, to the Tlingit-Haida tribe and former members of the Memorial Presbyterian Church for the church's unjust and racially motivated closure.

Acknowledgement, Apology, and Reparations

Our week of learning and sharing regarding acknowledgement, apology, and reparations (despite a few glitches) exceeded all our expectations.

The deacons blessed us with more food – chosen to respond to those with special dietary needs - than we could possibly eat during our days of meetings, and the congregation added to that with a wonderful meal Tuesday evening after the special service. Special thanks are due to Melody Millard, who was the master planner, and her steadfast helpers: Susan Bus, Carol Barril, Janet Kussart, Kristi Peel, and Denise Carroll.

The representatives from the Presbyterian Church (USA) (Jermaine Ross-Allam, Corey Schlosser-Hall, and Dianna Wright) and Northwest Coast Presbytery (Matt Paul) arrived as scheduled. Irv Porter had to cancel a few days ahead due to an injury. It was such a pleasure to meet in person with them after weeks of Zoom. They added fresh perspectives and deep knowledge regarding reparations to our discussions.

Representatives of small Presbyterian churches in Southeast (Angoon, Craig/Klawock, Ketchikan, Metlakatla, Wrangell, and Yakutat) were able to travel to join us thanks to Jane Ginter's tireless "travel agent" services and the hospitality of our members who offered them housing and transportation (Morley and Doogans, Alters, Patsy Wright, and Ginter/Coghill). Despite some leaving early due to the Covid outbreak, they all spoke positively about the experience and expressed gratitude for being invited. We trust they, and perhaps representatives from the other small churches, will be able to join us in October.

Some very special people stepped up to facilitate and participate in various events. They are all listed in the program that was distributed by email to everyone (if you didn't receive the program, please let the office know and one will be provided). The biographies contained in the program tell you about who they are but cannot express the depth of experience they offered, nor their willingness to share themselves in a personal and vulnerable way. Their words are seared into us and will help guide our continuing learning and reparations work.

We were oriented to place and time on Monday and got to spend time getting to know each other. Thirty-two people took part in the talking circle on Tuesday: in addition to the expert facilitator, representatives of our denomination and some members of our church, family members of Dr. Walter Soboleff and members of the Memorial Presbyterian Church (MPC) and their descendants joined us in the newly named Reverand Dr. Walter Soboleff Memorial Hall. The statements were moving and commanding. There is still so much to do.

Between the Wednesday panels on historical trauma (in our sanctuary) and on strength of mind, body, and spirit (at the Sealaska Heritage Institute Clan House Shuká Hít), we toured the Glory Hall, Forgot-Me-Not Manor (originally Housing First), and the reentry programs of Central Council of Tlingit & Haida Indians of Alaska. Their innovative and individualized programs helped us see paths forward for those who have experienced harm and who are struggling to lead healthier lives and for our community. And, still, there is so much to do.

We had to cancel the work sessions regarding scholarships and support for small churches due to the Covid outbreak, however everyone who was specifically invited to participate was assured that we will follow-up to further the work that began during informal discussions. Cancelling dinner

with its rich opportunities to engage one-on-one (and eat delicious food together) was especially sad, but keeping everyone safe was our priority.

We have video of all sessions, except the Talking Circle, and are planning to show the panel on Strength of Mind, Body, and Spirit sometime this month. One of our glitches was that we hadn't made adequate Zoom arrangements for that session. The video is film quality taped by Gabe Strong of G-Force Productions with help from Soren Sieberts from Anchorage. Both stepped up on short notice. We have long-term aspirations for commissioning a documentary with this material and that of the formal apology.

Reflections about the experiences and learning, and planning for what comes next, began Thursday afternoon and continued at the Healing Task Force that resumed weekly meetings on September 5. We know this much now. On October 7, we expect to place a temporary memorial at the Firehall, the former site of the Memorial Presbyterian Church. On October 8, there will be a worship service dedicated to acknowledgement, apology, and reparation. As requested by the Soboleff family, it will occur at Kunéix Hídi Northern Light United Church. It is being planned by Pastor Charles with leadership from the PC(USA) and the Presbytery.

What comes after the service and on October 9 depends on the planning for October 9, Indigenous Peoples' Day. We are awaiting an opportunity to engage again with Central Council

President Richard Peterson who changed his plans for last week so he could welcome the Presbyterian delegates on Monday and take part in the strength panel; he also met before and after the events to talk about future partnerships. We are especially grateful for his engagement.

Do keep your calendars clear for all three days – October 7-9. Detailed information will follow as we continue our work.

I also want to thank our new Pastor, Charles Ensminger, for engaging wholeheartedly in this work since his arrival two months ago. His sermons inspired us as they led up to our week of preparation and his willingness to step into every void to make sure our systems worked as well as possible helped us stay close to on schedule when "glitches" had to be resolved.

Finally, I want to share my gratitude to the members of the Native Ministries Committee who have been actively participating in the Healing Task Force ensuring that we stay on the right path to meaningful apology and reparations and without whom a mountain of the work that has been done, would not have been done. Gunalchéesh Háw'aa.

Cole Church from Yale Michigan - Mission to ERUMC

ERUMC was blessed to host 23 volunteers from the Cole Church in Michigan from August 15-23, 2023, led by Pastor Julie Cramer. These 23 volunteers were a very gifted and talented group with a very positive and can-do attitude. Carpenters, electricians, plumbers, engineers, equipment operators, foundation experts, kitchen crews, and painters all with many years of experience all made significant contributions; they accomplished many of the maintenance projects the ERUMC had on their wish list for years.

With ERUMC arranging the transportation for these volunteers they saved an estimated \$5,000 in commercial car rental cost. Bob Coghill and Jane were there with a welcome sign banner! The volunteers all wore shirts with the logo "Here I am, Send me" from Isaiah 6:8.

Tasks accomplished:

After a very nice welcome and introduction by Libby and Paul, and a tour of the camp these folks immediately went to work. Boy, were they good and fast! Thanks to the good organization of projects by Randy Peterson, Jesse/Libby, Don Gotschall, Charlie Carlson, and Paul Beran, each of the volunteers joined a project leader and started to tackle the tasks at hand. The project leaders were: Don Gotschall, Charlie Carlson, Paul Beran, Steve Landvik, and Nico Bus.

1. Bathhouse - The bathhouse went through a complete metamorphosis. Toilets, showers, and sinks were thoroughly cleaned, replaced, and/or refurbished. Partitions were modified, ripped out, and/or rebuilt. Both the men's and women's sides were painted. The areas under the sinks were enclosed and storage areas were created. Outside lights were replaced.

The roof trimming was finished. The net result is a much cleaner, better looking bathhouse for all to share!

- 2. Bunchberry Cabin The cabin's foundation had rotted away and was replaced with a new treated lumber beam. Roof leaks were fixed and a broken skylight was replaced by a new panel. Door framing and mosquito netting were replaced and upgraded. So rather than losing this cabin for campers to use it has now been saved!
- 3. Lodge The roof's framing was rebuilt and a new rubber cover was installed. The entry interior was repainted and the volunteer team built a very nice new "Welcome" sign. This all greatly improved the look of the main access point into the lodge.
- 4. Manager's cabin The cabin was leveled (it was 4" off level!) by replacing a rotten corner foundation post. The rotten skirting was replaced with treated plywood and insulation was added. New gravel was put around the cabin and the whole appearance improved. The crawl space now has better insulation which will help to prevent the pipes from freezing.
- 5. Fire Circle Multiple benches around the fire pit had fallen into disrepair. New seats were cut out from logs off the property and gravel moved in. The bark was peeled off the logs. The roof was cleaned and the fire ring was rebuilt with new rock and made deeper. Camp manager Jesse was very helpful with the use of his tractor to move gravel, and his skills to cut the logs into the benches. All the construction debris, the stumps that were pulled when building the water softener drain, and general debris from around the camp was burned by the mission crew.

 6. Lodge grease trap housing A housing over the top the grease trap was built with better

insulation to provide year-round access, and it

now will help to avoid future freeze-ups.

- 7. The lodge's auxiliary electric box and other camp electrical issues were addressed.
- 8. Kitchen The kitchen was thoroughly cleaned. The stoves were deep cleaned, especially the filters and the grease trays. All surfaces were wiped down with bleach.

The bread mixer, newly repaired by Mark Choquette, and its electrical outlet were tested and are working again! Thanks, Mark!

- 9. Handicap ramps Both of the Gotschall and Maier cabins' handicap ramps were repaired and upgraded, and gravel was added around the steps, the handicap ramp, and over the drain field. The lodge's handicap ramp was sanded and varnished.
- 10. Cabin cleaning, refreshing, and decorating Most all the cabins were deep cleaned and wiped down with bleach. Several ladies went to St. Vincent de Paul and picked up decorating items for each cabin. Each place now is cozier and cleaner.

We are so blessed that these wonderful volunteers accomplished so much in such a short time. They by far exceeded all our expectations! Our camp was the beneficiary of over 1,000 hours of labor by the 23 mission and ERUMC volunteers.
