### "Are We Still Usable?"

With the arrival of November, we find the time of the year to become more reflective. For the Christian community, that comes with the arrival of All Saints Sunday. Often celebrated on the first Sunday of the month of November, it is a time of commemoration. But it has a more transcendent meaning than that. The term "the saints" was used in the New Testament to refer to Christians collectively. Yet as time has moved us away from that second century understanding, it has become something of a bittersweet day – not dissimilar from Ash Wednesday – in that it is a day that recalls those who have died. All our saints.

All Saints is a bittersweet day. It, in some ways, forces us to confront our mortality as well as the mortality of all those around us. It brings to mind, perhaps, the great sense of loss we find when we have lost someone in our lives and we become members of, as John Claypool wrote, the "fraternity of the bereaved." It is also the moment where we gather to remember that we are not, as Paul says, like those who have no hope.

All Saints is a particular day of memory. We recall those persons in our family of faith who have died in the past year. And while they are certainly not here, in many ways they continue to be pre-

sent – especially in the grand moment of Holy Communion. As the writer of Hebrews put it, "we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses," (Hebrews 12:1).

All Saints is also a proper time to reflect on the witness of the saints and how we may or may not measure up to their example. As a church, have we striven after the more noble, narrow way? Have we, in being surrounded by that cloud of witnesses, lived up to their witness? Would we reflect the faith that can change the world?

say After Ten Years writes this challenging passage: "We have been the silent witnesses of evil deeds, we have been washed by many waters, we have learned the arts of deceit and ambiguous speech; ex-

been washed by many waters, we have learned the arts of deceit and ambiguous speech; experience has made us distrustful of [people] and we have often failed to speak truly and freely to them; unbearable conflicts have made us pliable, or perhaps even cynical – are we still usable?"

Are we still usable? Place the emphasis on each word in turn and you find that there are four pressing questions here. In the light of All Saints, are we still usable? Are we still usable? Are we still usable? Or are we still usable? They all have their power and troubling answers.

As I write this, I can glance over at my bookshelf and see collections of writings of women and men from centuries past to just a few years ago and recognize that some of the "great cloud of witnesses" sit whispering to me off the shelf each day. Some, like Bonhoeffer, do not whisper so much as call – maybe even harangue – me and challenge me to be a better person, especially should I dare to claim the title of Christian. Martin Luther reminds me to "remember to whom I belong"; Wesley challenges me to give God my whole heart; Linda Mercadante reminds me that the nature of the church and the people we seek to reach is changing and changing fast; Tertullian reminds me that cultural acceptance of violence leads to dark times; and then Bonhoeffer... he asks me to consider if I am still usable.

All Saints is a powerful day because it points us both backwards and forward; backwards to remember and hear the call on our lives, and forwards to live out our faith. "There are persons who think it inane, and Christians who think it impious to hope for a better earthly future and to prepare for it," Bonhoeffer writes. "It may be that the world will end tomorrow. If so, we will gladly lay down our work for a better future, but not until then."

Until that time, we continue to work for all the saints as we also would want to be in that number. And, since we are numbered among them by God's grace, we have all the more reason to ask, "Are we still usable?" Let us delve deep into our hearts and strive to answer, "Yes. Here I am, Lord. Send me."

### **New Member Class**

Beginning on Sunday, November 26<sup>th</sup>, there will be a "new member" class for those who have recently joined *AS WELL AS* for those who might be considering joining or for anyone who would like to attend! We will be meeting at 10:00 on Sunday morning in the Skuse room and will be covering a variety of topics related

to our church history, the history, structure, and theology of the Presbyterian Church and the United Methodist Church, and some basic Christian theological understandings. Pastor Charles will be teaching the class and all are welcome!

### Glory Hall Apartment Project

The council authorized a total donation of \$75,000 to renovate the downtown Glory Hall building into apartments for low-income housing. The total amount will come from individual donations to this project, any funds authorized by the Native Ministries committee, and the remainder will be drawn from the unrestricted reserve funds. Donations to this project will be received through the end of November.

### **Finance News**

As of October 30, KHNLUC has received offerings to the general operating fund representing about 74% of the annual budgeted amount of \$261,500. We are 83% of the way through the year. Donations received for Food Security through October 30 total \$9651. Expenses so far total \$14,509 (Summer Lunch:

\$8856, Family Promise Meals \$150, Glory Hall meals \$1042, and Weekend Food Bags \$4461), a shortage of almost \$5000. We will have more expenses for the Weekend Food Bags through the end of December. Any additional contributions to the General Fund or the Food Security fund will be greatly appreciated.

### **Council Focuses on Finances**

At its October 19 Meeting the Church Council:

- Committed Kunéix Hídi to providing at least \$75,000 toward the costs of renovating the former downtown Glory Hall building into efficiency apartments for use by low-income Juneauites. It is the Council's intention to use Church reserves to make up the difference between congregational contributions toward this goal and the total of \$75,000. Donations to this project will be received through the end of November.
- Reviewed the last few years' finances. In recent years Church expenditures have exceeded revenue a situation that cannot continue unchanged.
- Set the Pledge Drive in support of the 2024 budget for the month of November. During the Drive members and friends of Kunéix Hídi NLUC will be asked to consider pledging financial support of Church programs and services during the upcoming calendar year.
- Was reminded that the Akiyama family will match all known contributions to either the Church's Programmatic or Capital Permanent Endowment Fund dollar-to-dollar (to a maximum of \$13,000 for each Fund) until the end of November.
- Approved the Deacons plan to obtain a new set of Church coffee cups (for use in the Soboleff Memorial Hall) with our new logo and name on the cups.
- Sent a letter of congratulations to Dr. Tina Woods (who helped in numerous ways with our congregation's apology and reparations activities for the racist closure of the Memorial; Presbyterian Church) for her recent receipt of the Helping Hands Foundation Dr Tom Bornstein Health Provider Award for 2023.

- 1. The camp managers had to move out of their housing at the camp due to a mold problem. This will have an impact on the reservations of our facilities as it is now more difficult to reach ERUMC. Please be patient in the coming months. We are hiring an abatement contractor to fix the mold problem. In the meantime the managers are staying temporarily at the Maier cabin taking this cabin off the rental market. This is a serious problem and our highest priority to remedy!
- 2. October 7th we had our annual Chop-A-Thon but due to problems with the splitter we have to have another wood-splitting session. This coming Saturday November 4, 2023, we will finish what we started and hope to be able to split all the remaining rounds. Volunteers are welcome to finish the splitting of the wood and this and other projects will be tackled from 9:00 am to noon.
