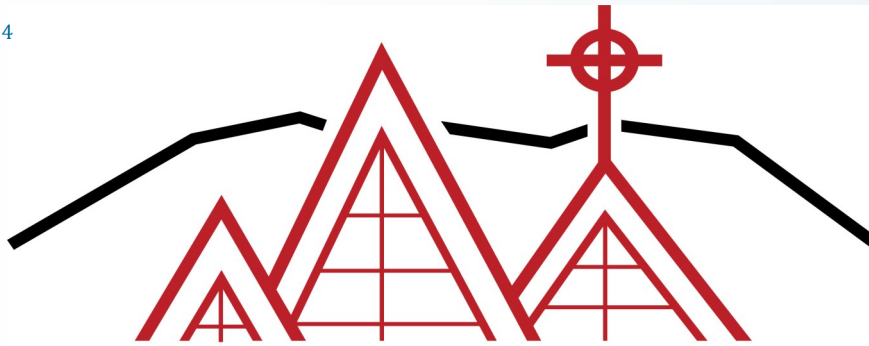

From the continued fighting in Ukraine – and I read an article that suggested that Russia's economy is now so tied to the war effort that, winning or losing, ending the war may no longer be in their financial best interest – the slaughter of Palestinians, the domineering militarism that has grown in the middle east, the troubling news of federal vs. local on the southern border between ourselves and Mexico as Mexico City faces the possibility of a crippling drought, to the true brokenness

of a political system that is rapidly losing those who wish to legislate and govern to those who seem to thrive on chaos. There is plenty of brokenness to go around. And I haven't even started on education, educational systems and the growing cultural abandonment of an emphasis on learning.

However, we Christians continue to sing "Easter people, raise your voices!" Why? Because in the darkness, we must listen closely to the words of Jesus the Christ who said to those who would be his disciples, "You are the light of the world. Let your light shine before others." (See Matthew 5:14-16). In the darkness of chaos, we are to remain a light – even if sometimes that light seems very, very small.

It is our responsibility to be and to offer something other than chaos. The Church has been privileged to have been given that "something" – the Good News of Christ – to offer for over 2,000 years. We have succeeded and we have failed. Now, though, we need to work diligently and deliberately to offer that Good News and to do it in a way that honors God, honors our neighbors, and

seeks to be a voice for peace, hope, and a better way.

Locally, our work on developing a vision and a series of trajectories for our church is how we continue to bring the Good News to the people. We have so many opportunities to share hope! We have so many ways in which we can grow in our faith individually and collectively. We have an abundance to offer, and if ever we have been called to be Easter People, it seems now is the time. We stand with those who call for peace, for we follow the Prince of Peace. We stand with those who are burdened, we stand with those who weep. For we believe that in all things, the Kingdom of God is not made from bullets and bombs, walls or wars. It begins when we recognize that we are each other's neighbors, and as such, we have a light to offer to them in the darkness. If we will.

May we continue the serious work of visioning and the spiritual path of Lent. May we hear the Good News that Easter brings to us and, in so hearing, share it with the world. Peace be with you.

the February Church council meeting focused, in many regards, on preparing to conduct its 2024 responsibilities.

New officers were elected. Maxine Richert was elected as the 2024 Council Moderator with Jim Alter chosen to be vice-Moderator. Margaret Pugh was re-elected as Council Clerk. Mary Becker will serve, for the next two years, as our representative to the northwest coast Presbytery. Margaret MacKinnon agreed to continue as the Church treasurer.

Once more detailed information is provided by the committee on Property Management, the Council will conduct a fund-raising effort to help pay for the numerous capital projects expected to be undertaken during 2024.

The council is seeking volunteers to develop a process for using endowment earnings received by K̄unéix̄ Hídi for the support of music education of Juneau youth and/or children. The endowment already has almost \$40,000 in available funds and regularly receives several thousand dollars each year as further earnings available for distribution. Here's some chores maybe you can help out with! Or if you see other things to do at church either let us know or take it on! Come on two Saturdays in March or whenever it's convenient for you. Some of these tasks will be better accomplished a little later in the Spring. We'd love your help during the Spring and Summer.

## Clean up continued

### Church grounds

Help with church grounds any way that you think needs to be done!

### Clean the wooden pews

We have Murphy's Wood Soap and lots of clean cloths. There are pencil markings that need to be removed. Thank you for your time and energy!

### Cleanup sidewalks

Sweep sidewalks all around the church and manse. Continue to clean sidewalks as needed. We'd like to save the gravel for future use.

### Communion Trays

Communion Trays Check out communion trays to see if they need to be cleaned or polished.

### Dump run with yard and other waste

As we trim bushes, trees, etc., we may have yard waste. There are new rules for taking waste to dump. The church has a commercial account with Waste Management for the Capitol Disposal Landfill. ### Polish brass candlesticks, cross, offering plates

Polish the brass at altar and any other brass items around, such as candlesticks, cross, offering plates.

### Power thatch yards at church and manse

We can rent a power thatcher from Don Abel. It helps the lawns a lot if we can get them thatched before the lawn starts growing. Can you help?

### Power wash parking lot & sidewalks

## Should worship start at one time year-round?

*A personal opinion column from Jane Ginter*

I'd like to start a discussion about if we should consider choosing a time for worship on Sunday morning and keep to that time year-round. I encourage us to use the visioning process to discuss this further.

Our current practice is to start church at 11 am during the school year and at 10 am during the summer. We use Memorial Day and Labor Day as bookends to split the year.

### **Here are some reasons to consider having worship at one time:**

- Avoid confusion when the worship time changes
- Avoid complicated wording on web, signs, publicity.
- Encourage "All are welcome here" by avoiding an "insider mentality." Those most "in the know" can keep up with the changes, but the somewhat active and less active will not, nor will guests or occasional visitors.

I do not have a strong opinion on what time the service should start and I believe the pastor, Council and congregation should come to a consensus on whether to switch times and, if not, what time the single service should be.

### **Are there other churches that switch their time?**

I thought it'd be interesting to see if other churches offer starting times that differ with the season. Of all the churches I looked at in Juneau and United Methodist churches in Alaska, I found several churches that used to switch times, but have changed to one time.

I only found one church that switches times. It is UMC Moose Pass which shares a pastor with UMC Seward. "We worship in Moose Pass at 9 AM in the summer and 5 PM in the winter." I learned this weekend that the UMC Moose Pass has decided to keep their worship service at 9 am year-round.

I have a spreadsheet with all the info I've been able to find and I'll share that with you if you'd like.

We used to have two services on Sunday, at 9 and at 11 am. When we went to one service, we initially changed the time of the service in the summer because some members missed having the 9 am service and wanted to get out from church earlier in the day on Sunday.
