Theological Conversation

Christians have often thought that it is important to believe the right thing. What those things are have, from the beginning of the Christian movement, changed. There have been controversies about what constitutes the "correct" belief for the Christian since the time of Jesus. Just think: Jesus asked, "Who do people say that I am?" Even then there were multiple answers. Do we find salvation through faith or through our actions? How do we address the issue of suffering with a loving God? What did the term "Son of God" mean in the Old Testament, the New Testament, and today? These are what are sometimes called "theological questions."

Non-violent communication

Have you ever been frustrated by not being able to figure out how to have meaningful conversations without having them turn into arguments that go nowhere? Would you like to learn how to connect on a heart to heart level with others across the barriers that divide us? You might find Non-Violent Communication (NVC) useful. NVC provides several benefits, letting us:

- Resolve conflict in many forms and in various areas of our lives
- Enjoy deeper, more productive relationships
- Take ownership of our feelings and actions Stay conscious of choice in every moment The Social Justice and Service Committee plans to offer an introduction to NVC. Theological Conversation continued

Theology is the term used to describe the way Christians think and speak about God. It is the currency of Biblical discussion. But it can also become the mortar for the bricks used to build barriers that keep us from loving our neighbors (who may attend a different church altogether) and, quite possibly, from loving ourselves. Theology can open us up to the divine Mystery that is the presence of God, and it can also shut the doors to new experiences altogether.

We all have our theologies. We all have our ideas and constructions regarding God, scripture, and even morality. And while theology is the currency of Biblical discussion, it can also be the bricks used to build the walls between us or, in some horrible instances, theology can be that which sharpens the swords we use against our neighbors.

That's too bad.

Talking with theological terms can be an exciting and wonderful experience. It can deepen our appreciation of the Numinous, the "Wholly Other" that is God in a way casual conversation cannot. But holding theological opinions, like political ones, can create contentiousness. Especially in this day and age when we have almost abandoned the idea of meeting in the middle, acknowledging differences of opinions, and speaking with civility.

Somewhere along the line, though, we need to remember that the first Christians were interested in deepening their relationship with God and that God was embodied in the person of Jesus.

Jesus, interestingly enough, did not offer much in the way of theology – he never spoke about the Trinity directly, never talked about slavery, nor did he mention which 21st century political party he would back. Instead, he talked about love, a God of grace, and extending mercy and compassion to all.

Perhaps it is there we might wish to return to continue our conversations. Because sometimes we can know our theology better than we know God with us. And that might make all the difference.

Quick update for Supporters of Juneau Refugee Resettlement

Greetings to our supporters!

This is a quick update to share some good news and to enlist your help.

First, the good news: our first Ukrainian family has a new yearlong rental agreement for their two-bedroom place and our second family just put money down on their own mobile home!

All our adult refugees are working, especially now that construction season is in full swing. We are especially proud of 18-yearold Olha Klub, who just earned her CNA (Certified Nursing Aide) certification and is working for our local Bartlett Hospital. With Jo Boheme and Beatrice Franklin taking the lead, there was a celebration picnic for Olha at Lena Beach.

Next, your help: for Juneau supporters who might be tuned into local real estate, the Ukrainian Klub family of four are still needing a place. They can pay up to \$2,000/month for rent with utilities. A three-bedroom would be ideal. They would like to live near Auke Bay Elementary School. The family has to be out of their home by August as the owners will be moving in.

Vitalli and Daryna will have to move out of their place as their landlords are planning to use it as a B & B. They need a twobedroom in the Valley.

We also have Haitian refugees in town. One of them, Jean Marie, arrived recently and is looking for housing along a bus route. He is in his 40s, super nice, fluent in English, a high school grad with some IT experience and has worked in maintenance. For now, renting a room in someone's home or exchanging help around the home for a room would be great. He is hoping to bring his 16-year-old daughter to Juneau and will need his own place by the end of summer.

Summer Lunch Program

SUMMER IS COMING! And with it our Summer Lunch Program. For the ninth year, <u>Kunéix</u> Hídi Northern Light United Church will provide a children's summer lunch program at the Geneva Woods housing complex in Douglas where all children, whatever their circumstances, are welcome to participate. Summer lunches ensure that lowincome children enjoy at least one nutritious, delicious hot meal every weekday during the summer.

This year we will serve the congregate lunches inside the Community Room or provide lunches to go. We expect to provide an opportunity for the children to participate in art projects, games and other activities before and after lunch.

We are excited to announce that SamMi Zelley has been hired as Site Coordinator. SamMi has the necessary skills and a passion for helping those who experience food insecurity.

Our lunch service will begin on June 3rd and end on Friday, August 16th. Meals will be served from 12:15-1:00. Our Summer Lunch program is supported by contributions of money and time from KHNLUC members and friends.

Volunteers will be needed throughout the summer. Our Site Coordinator is a critical member of the team, but we must have volunteers to cook and pack meals at the KHNLUC kitchen and help serving meals at Geneva Woods. Cooking may be from scratch (with help documenting that the recipe meets the USDA standards) or preparing one of the recipes provided. Our Site Coordinator will have weekly menus and have ingredients ready for the meal prep.

Sign up early to choose your spots! You can sign up on the KHNLUC website, choose

Serve in the drop down menu. Our Summer Lunch Coordinator will transport the food, clean up at Geneva Woods and the KHNLUC kitchen, and do lots of other tasks that make our program work.

Everyone who participates in food preparation, packing or serving must have a current food worker card. You can study for and take the test online; it is good for three years; and it only costs \$10 (refundable if you submit for reimbursement). To sign up: (1) click on <u>https://dec.alaska.gov/eh/fss/</u> food-worker-card/, (2) click on Getting a Food Worker Card and follow the instructions there; (3) download and send a copy of your card to Christina Maddox at office@khnluchurch.org. It is really easy.
