

I write this in Tennessee, amid the amazing beauty of autumn colors and wide blue skies that form the backdrop to the Smokey Mountains. I also write this amid the stunning disaster that befell the area weeks ago when the flooding Nolichucky River changed its course and destroyed swaths of land and property from North Carolina down into Greene County, Tennessee. And I also write this amid the necrotic affliction that is the current political rhetoric within the United States. I write this surrounded by such a wide variety of forces.

I write this after listening to friends and former parishioners who speak of the jarring and tragic disruption within the congregations of the UMC who are debating the merits of staying UMC or leaving the UMC, of friendships that have been sacrificed over ideological lines in the sand. I write this after visiting with friends that, most

November is a busy month! Our services this month are also going to be a bit different from week to week, which is exciting and, I hope, an opportunity to encounter the presence of God in different ways.

To begin with, we will be celebrating All Saints Sunday, a time of remembrance and reflection as well as participating in Holy Communion.

The second Sunday of November is Walter Soboleff Sunday. In recognition of that day, we want to encourage you to invite a friend to church that particular Sunday. The service will be a special one designed to teach, as the sermon title suggests, "Why We Do What We Do."

Finally, we will come to the end of the Christian Year with Christ the King Sunday, a wonderful time of reflection and anticipation as Advent rapidly approaches in December.

likely, I will not be able to see again as their health is deteriorating rapidly.

I write this after climbing the trail to Sunset Rock in Chattanooga, Tennessee and looking out over the amazingly wide vista with no haze, no clouds, and seeing the beautiful countryside and the life and industry that is that part of the state. I write this with joy, with sadness, and with the profound realization that even though I spent most of my life in and around East Tennessee, I feel disconnected from it while still loving many elements of it at the same time.

I am writing this aware that All Saints Sunday is approaching. That time in which, at least for some within the Christian tradition, is a reflective time that bespeaks life, love, mortality and legacies. And I wonder what it is that I have accomplished as an individual and I wonder how much that compares with a desire to be kind and compassionate.

And I find that amid all of this, I remember. I remember the profound sense of calling in my life and in my heart. I remember the witness of my paternal grandfather whose voice I still hear speaking in memory. I remember the smells of my maternal grandparent's home, especially of freshly picked green beans and the aroma of the kitchen at dinner time. I remember my mother and I going to Hill's

Department Store in Johnson City after we had both had a bad day, her at work and me at school.

I write this with a profound appreciation of what the author of Hebrews describes as so great a cloud of witnesses. The author is declaring that our faith is bolstered by those who have lived and taught and enabled us to move in and through life and, in that bolstered faith, we are able to move in a way that is not governed by wind or fate or the powers that be. Instead, we move as those who, through faith, have our feet grounded in a different Kingdom. We move as those who find the ability to move on and carry forward not as those who lose heart, but as those who, amid all that surround us, still can know what it is to be people of peace.

And perhaps, no matter what may come later in November and into 2025, ours is to focus on faith. Being those who walk a different path and strive to consider Christ our Lord. Perhaps ours is to be aware of that great cloud of witnesses that surround us and learn from their examples that amid all that the world brings, there is at the beginning and end of it all, Good News to be found.

Moderator's Report

The Council met on October 3 and approved the following:

- 1. Bylaw amendments (goes to Congregation on 11/3).
- 2. November as Stewardship Month
- 3. New Outdoor Sign announcing time for church service
- 4. Purchase of new electronic sign (TV and cable) for front window.

The Council met on October 24 in a special meeting to approve \$9,500 for a second stove for the Glory Hall. Earlier the Church funded the first stove which had broken down and soon after the second stove broke down. This time our funds purchased a warranties. KJ Metcalf, chair of Social Justice Service Committee (George Partlow is co-chair), brought this request for funding to the council.

Moderator's Report continued

I attended the preview of the documentary on the Sinking of the Princess Sophia at the State Museum. The 15 minute preview noted by the speakers that the Sinking of the Sophia was the worst maritime event in Pacific NW history yet few people know about it. When the news hit the major newspapers, it was eclipsed by news that World War I was ending. Nearly 10% of Dawson City's population was on the ship. The videographer (is that a word?) noted that after viewing the passenger list he considered that Alaska (then a territory) and northern Canada had lost much of its leadership (potential leadership). I introduced myself to him and told him I was the great niece of Walter Harper (my middle name is Harper) and said it was really sad and ironic as Walter and his bride Frances Wells were on the ship to join the war movement (he wanted to be an ambulance driver and his wife was a nurse). The film maker (who was from Homer) said from all he had read about Walter (first man on top of the highest peak of Mt. McKinley (now Denali) Alaska had lost a leader.

Kudos to the youth who participated in our Youth Service day. They are already good speakers and their enthusiasm was uplifting. In 1959, I gave the sermon (reluctantly) at Youth Service Day at the Me-

morial Presbyterian Church. It was on Dr. Tom Dooley, a medical missionary in Africa. My mother picked the subject and typed my sermon. After I left the podium Dr. Soboleff explained my sermon briefly in Tlingit to the elders who nodded at me encouragingly. A few years later, I more enthusiastically interviewed Amos Wallace, Tlingit carver, and Alan Engstrom Sr. (then state Senator) and wrote papers on the interviews. Encouraging our youth to present the service inspires them to become more involved in community service and increases their leadership skills.

You may have been reading about the Apologies to the villages of Kake and Angoon by the Navy (for bombarding the villages), to the Douglas Indian Association by the City of Juneau for the burning of the Douglas Indian Village, and President Biden for the atrocities at the Indian Boarding Schools. I feel KHNLUC was a ground breaker for these apologies in that we were the first to include Acknowledgement, Apology and Reparations! I believe the apology to Kake did include reparations.

Churches across the world are targets of scamming attempts. Many of us in the church have received fake texts and emails that may appear to be from the pastor or from the church but are actually attempts to scam or attempt to get money from you.

DO NOT RESPOND to these attempts. Notice that the attempt is from an unknown phone or email address. They often state that you shouldn't call because they are in a meeting. If you respond, they will often ask you to purchase a gift card of some sort. No one in the church will ever contact you to ask for a gift card or any other scheme.

Consider Serving on an Elected Committee!

As 2024 approaches its end, the Kunéix Hídi Nominating Committee begins to look for members to be on various elected committees. The combination of new and experienced members serving on these committees allows our congregation to function in a responsible, fulfilling manner. However, this combination also requires everyone to take a turn at being on a committee.

Below is a list of our congregation's various committees and their responsibilities. Please look these over and decide on which of these you would be willing to serve. If you have questions, concerns, or just need more information, obtain that information from a member of the Nominating Committee (listed below).

Church Council

Kunéix Hídi's Board of Directors. Responsible for Church finances, policies and procedures; generally overseeing the overall functioning of our Church (as advised by the various standing committees) as well as our Church's relationship with the Presbyterian Church, USA and United Methodist Church.

Committee on Property and Management

The physical well-being of the church building, grounds, and manse.

Deacons

Hosting church events, especially when food and/or beverages are required; as well as preparing communion. Providing members with individual support and assistance when requested.

Social Justice and Service

Creating awareness and support for church programs of social justice and outreach.

Staff-Parish Relations Committee

Serve as a link and liaison between the pastor and congregation.

All of the above committee members serve for 3-year terms. Committees typically meet once a month for an hour or so and often involve follow-up activities of a volunteer nature, as appropriate.

Each of the above committees have a half to full-page detailed description in the KHNLUC Bylaws. Thus, the above descriptions are "bare bone." For more information about any specific committee, please contact their current chairs: Council: Maxine Richert; CPM: Duff Mitchell; Deacons: Carol Barril; SJSC: KJ Metcalf and George Partlow; SPRC: Mary Borthwick. Once you enter your email address, follow the directions on-screen to complete the create log-in process. After you sign in, you'll see the most up-to-date directory for our church. Any time up-dates are made, they will show on the Online Members' Website, too. online to view your church directory.

Our church directory is also available to view on your mobile device! Instant Church Directory the program we use to build our church directory - has a free app for church members to download on their Apple and Android devices. Go to Google Play or Apple Apps to download Instant Church Directory.

You will be asked to enter your email address as it's listed in our directory. If your email address isn't listed in the directory, let Jane Ginter (ginteralaska@gmail.com) know so it can be added. Once you enter your email address follow the directions on screen to complete the login process. After you login, the directory will be downloaded to your device. Anytime updates are made, they will update on your device too. In the app you will be able to search for families and members and call, email and text right from the app.

Sign up to be a Greeter!

This is one of the most important and rewarding opportunities in the church. You get to meet and greet those arriving for worship. We are no longer asking folks to "check-off" their names on the check off sheet, so the usher job is a lot easier!

Look at your calendar and see when you can serve as usher. Sign up once a month if you can!

The usher arrives about 9:30 a.m., one-half hour before the service is scheduled to begin, 10 a.m. year-round. The usher should: Welcome worshipers, especially those who appear to be new to KHNLUC. Mention to people with children that there are crayons, coloring books, and books available. There is a nursery downstairs. If they are visitors, invite them to sign the visitor card or sign-in sheet.

Provide a bulletin.

The usher should remain towards the back of the church during the service to assist late arrivals.

During Joys & Concerns, the usher will pick up the microphone from the back, making sure it is turned ON, and take it to those who wish to speak.

The Worship Leader or the usher will read Joys & Concerns from Zoom Chat. Those on Zoom will be asked if they want to unmute and speak. Rather than reading all the Zoom requests together, the congregation should reply to each one: "Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer."

You can be an important part of what makes our worship together a good experience.

Our web site, https://khnluc.org/, offers a section where you can help with worship. You can also tell Christina to sign you up if you prefer not to use the computer.

Everyone is invited to be part of our worship service.

The liturgist reads the scripture and helps lead the service with the pastor. Sign up to be a liturgist on the sign-up sheet in Memorial Hall or call the office.

You can serve as liturgist if you worship with us via Zoom.

The ushers greet people before the service, pass out bulletins, pass the offering plate, and assist with the prayers and announcements from the congregation. Sign up to be an usher.

The altar flowers are provided by the congregation. Sign up to provide flowers for worship.

You can provide flowers even if you worship via Zoom. Flowers can be brought to the church before Sunday if that is more convenient for you. Ask Christina for the key code to enter the side door on A Street.

We encourage you to think ahead and plan to help out. Pick a special day for providing flowers to honor a loved one. Maybe sign up once a month to be liturgist or usher.
