Facing the Future

In the book of Jeremiah there is an oft quoted verse that states, "Surely I know the plans I have for you,' says the Lord, 'plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (Jeremiah 29:11)

This verse is in the context of Israel's having been conquered by the Babylonians. There is a sense of dread and hopelessness that surrounded the political landscape and the people feared God had abandoned them. Thus, Jeremiah brings welcome words to the people on God's behalf – simply to know that there is a future was uplifting. To declare that God is looking to give a future with hope was amazing!

That's because then, as now, the future is often viewed through dystopian lenses and without hope. I heard an interviewee on a talk show once answer the question of "how are things going?" with the answer, "Well, once I gave up hope, things smoothed out."

That kind of hopelessness is powerful, addictive, and contagious. And when the Christian faith becomes infected with it, it is downright crushing.

In January, we began the Season of Epiphany which lasts until Ash Wednesday, which is March 5th. So, as the Epiphany season continues, I will continue to focus on the challenge of Epiphany: what might it mean to come to a moment of profound realization personally or as the church? What can this season provide for us as we struggle to *be* a follower of Christ? I would add that a book that influenced some of my thinking on these particular sermons was a book by Jacques Ellul called The Subversion of Christianity. Some of his ideas and themes have been utilized in the writing of these sermons.

Yet, as Jürgen Moltmann wrote in his book *Theology of Hope*, "What would become of us if we did not take our stand on hope, and if our heart did not hasten beyond this world through the midst of the darkness upon the path illuminated by the word and Spirit of God!" What would become of the church if we had no hope? How could we offer that which we did not have?

Two answers. First, we have to be able to speak to the hopeless without condemning their hopelessness. We have to be with people in the darkest times. Second, we have to walk in the darkness, but we also have to walk with a light that comes from faith. That faith is a gift to offer - a light in the darkness. Billy Joel once sang it this way: "They say that these are not the best of times, but they are the only times I have ever known." The church must learn how to be in the face of the future and in the face of hopelessness as Jeremiah did for the people of Israel in their time of crisis.

Therefore, we are to be *here*.

The task before us this year is to learn, teach, and understand what it means to be *present* as we move into the future. We are going to be working to consider new ways of ministry and what we can do to be more effective in our outreach, our worship, and in bringing the Good News of God's grace to the communities around us.

But before we even get to that, I would suggest that we take a moment here at the beginning of the year and offer a prayer that is attributed to St. Francis and truly reflect on what it is for which we pray:

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace, Where there is hatred, let me sow love: where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy; O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand: to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

Amen. So may it be!

Moderator's January Report

At the last Council Meeting (1/9/25), several action items were approved including ordering printing of the 50 year history of KHNLUC written by Margaret McKinnon. We celebrated the 50th year anniversary on 9/22/24 at which time former Pastor Phil Campbell was approved as Pastor Emeritus. Dates for the neighborhood party (June 1) and Sandy Beach picnic (8/24) were also approved pending Pastor's availability. On February 13, Council will also approve other dates for 2025. Note approved Council minutes are posted on the bulletin board.

Council also reviewed annual reports submitted by committees for the upcoming Annual Meeting (which was 1/19/25).

Jim Alter was thanked for his service on Council (he had served 2 3-year terms, the max allowed). Susan Bus, Sherrie Myers and my first terms were ending and we agreed to being nominated to serve another 3-year term.

On January 12, Pastor Charles led a visioning session after Sunday Service with a potluck brunch. On January 16, the Native Ministries Committee held a visioning session at a potluck dinner with members of the Native Community. A report on this visioning session is in the newsletter.

The annual meeting of KHNLUC was held on 1/19 following the Sunday service and brunch served by the Germains and others. Superintendent Kristi McGuire officiated the annual meeting (recording secretary Maxine Richert). All committee reports were presented and some committee chairs provided brief summary and answered questions. The Pastor reviewed the visioning process and work with the Ketchikan church. The Treasurer reported that more was contributed than budgeted. Action items included the salary of Pastor, the Nominating Committee report, and the membership report were approved. Accountability questions were answered. The cooks were thanked!!

This is my last report as a new Moderator will be elected at the February meeting.

Native Ministries Visioning Potluck Event

On January 16, 2025 Native Ministries Committee members met with invited guests from the Native Community to get their ideas on visioning the remodel of the Rev. Dr. Walter Soboleff Hall. Pattie Adkisson organized the event and contacted people to attend but had a trip that prevented her attending. Other members present were: Barbara Searls (Chair), Freda Westman, Pastor Charles, Judy Ramos, and Maxine Richert. Judy Ramos (for those who don't know her) is from Yakutat, a professor of Alaska Native Studies at UAS, and has advised the National Museum of the American Indian in NYC on their renovations.

Menu: Barbara cooked a delicious chicken adobo and rice (a Filipino dish but a favorite among SE Alaska Natives who have many different ways of cooking this dish). Freda delighted us with a fresh herring egg green garden salad (another Tlingit delicacy) with rolls brought by Elsie, and Maxine offered 3 desserts to choose from: bread pudding, cherry pie and pear/mango tart. Our guests were: Janet Soboleff Burke, Royal DeAsis (he participated in the Apology and is a former Memorial Presbyterian Church member), Patty McNeil (she participated in the Apology and was also a MPC member) and her daughter Jessica Isturis, Fran Houston (head of the Aak'w Kwaan Tlingit), Marcello Quinto (leader in the Native and Filipino community who often caters special events using KHNLUC kitchen), Elsie Westman, and Harold Westman (both attend KHNLUC).

Our visioning discussion was lively with ideas offered by all. Janet Burke made a generous offer to donate items that belonged to her father that would fill a display case. All of the ideas will be submitted along with previous visioning discussions held by the congregation and other committees. Renovation of the Dr. Soboleff Hall is part of the Reparations and an important goal of KHNLUC to reflect Dr. Soboleff's ministry, make the church more welcoming to the Native Community, to the congregation and community organizations that utilize our church.
