## The Weight of Lent

Ash Wednesday begins the Lenten season, which is a somber way to begin any season of the Church. But it brings with it the sense of awareness of mortality as well as a challenge to the faithful: following Jesus is not easy. It isn't necessarily difficult, but it isn't easy. This is because following Jesus means that we are offering our allegiance to him and his teachings.

It also means, like Joshua said to the Israelites, we must choose whom we will follow. If it is Jesus, then we must deliberately move in that direction, and hear what it is that he defines as the community – the Kingdom of God. However, in so doing, we find quickly that following Jesus can put us at odds with many other things, not the least of which is the community to which we adhere: the group, party, affiliation, or club where we find belonging.

Jesus often overturns what our community believes to be fundamental. As Bob Welch wrote in his book *Cross Purposes*, "The first shall be last' clashes with 'we must win.' 'The humble shall be exalted' clashes with 'we rule!' 'Love one another' clashes with

as one of reflection and repentance, I invite you to have those difficult internal conversations around what it means to follow Jesus. Lent is an uncomfortable time, but we are on this journey together. I invite you to join in solidarity, prayer, and support as we strive to hear of Jesus’ call to us.

## Council News

The Church Council started its first meeting of the new year by welcoming new members Karen Lipson, Margie Thompson, Patsy Wright and returning member Margaret Pugh.

United Methodist Superintendent and Director of Connectional Ministries Kristi McGuire presented a proposal that Pastor Charles serve the Ketchikan United Methodist Church on the dates he travels to Ketchikan for the Presbyterian Church plus one additional date and stay in Ketchikan from Friday to Sunday. After discussion the Council voted to approve Pastor Charles' travel to include the KUMC to his already scheduled dates in Ketchikan for the KPC, traveling Saturday and returning Sunday.

The Council elected Mary Becker as Moderator, Maxine Richert as Vice Moderator and Margaret Pugh as Clerk. Margaret MacKinnon accepted reappointment as treasurer and Jane Ginter accepted reappointment as Membership Chair. Congregational members Mary Borthwick and John Pugh were reappointed to the Finance Committee and Alan Akiyama to the Endowment/Investments Committee.

Upon recommendation from the Anderson Music Endowment Committee, Council granted awards of \$2500 to Juneau String Ensemble and \$5500 to Juneau Alaska Music Matters.

Maxine Richert, chair of Native Ministries, reported that they partnered with Goldbelt to provide 30 chairs from Costco to meet a need for chairs at the Glory Hall.

Susan Bus reported that KJ Metcalf and Don Gotschall are soliciting donations for the \$100,000 the Social Justice and Service Committee is raising to help the homeless.

Patsy Wright noted that the elevator project is now moving forward.

Monica Buettel highlighted the move of Birthday celebrations to the second Sunday of each month. She also noted that we will be asked to bring breads for Easter Sunday.

The next Council meeting will be March 12, 2026.

The Tlingit Gospel choir wrote a letter to Goldbelt Incorporated requesting chair donations and they immediately responded positively and ordered and delivered 32 of the specified chairs on February 19, 2026. We are so grateful to Goldbelt for their generosity and quick response that helps lessens the stress to Glory Hall patrons by allowing them to be seated to eat. To celebrate the chair donations, the Tlingit Gospel Singers and friends held a short program and sang This is the Day and Pastor Charles prayed a dedication prayer at the Glory Hall on February 20.

## Summer Lunch Coordinator needed

If you enjoy spending time with kids and want to help provide a hot lunch this summer, this job is for you!

KHNLUC will be providing a Summer Lunch program for children at Geneva Woods Housing Complex in Douglas, Monday through Friday, from June 1 through August 7, 2026 (tentative dates). We will be hiring a Summer Lunch Coordinator to oversee the program. This is a temporary, part-time position of approximately 25 hours per week and will include occasional hours for orientation, preparation and follow up paperwork. Pay is \$25 per hour, depending on experience, plus mileage reimbursement. Minimum requirements: 18 years of age, valid driver's license and personal vehicle, background check, food handler card, and completion of safe sanctuary and civil rights training (online, provided by KHNLUC).

Responsibilities include coordinating the Summer Lunch program with the help of volunteers. Additional duties include planning and shopping for food, assuring food safety requirements are being followed, and maintaining required paperwork. The Summer Lunch Coordinator will organize and help with food prep and cooking following recipes and a food plan, transport meals to Geneva Woods and be onsite during food service, clean up after lunch and interact with the children with occasional games or activities.

## Akiyama Family Endowed Scholarship

The stories Alan Akiyama has about his dad map out a lifetime of service across some of Southeast Alaska's most remote areas.

Henry Akiyama, M.D. '57, was a cardiologist whose 44-year career is defined by courage, compassion and care for the communities in and around Juneau, Alaska. Whether it was establishing the coronary care unit at Bartlett Regional Hospital in Juneau, educating EMTs on administering CPR and using portable defibrillators, or helicoptering into the Alaskan wilderness on rescue missions, Henry's passion for rural cardiac health care was unrivaled. From 1969 to 1982, Henry was at the scene of every cardiac arrest that occurred in Juneau, and he flew 17 helicopter and four fixed-wing rescue missions.

Together with his wife, Grace Akiyama, who championed many nonprofit and philanthropic efforts in Juneau, Henry established his family's tradition of service, care and giving back. Grace and Henry's legacy lives on through their son, Alan, who recently established the Akiyama Fam-

ily Endowed Scholarship to support students at the OHSU School of Medicine. OHSU shaped not just Henry's career, but the trajectory of his family. The tenets of service and philanthropy Alan live by today can be traced back to Henry's time studying at OHSU, where the story of his work in health care began. The scholarship honors these principles and is a token of gratitude toward OHSU for the impact the institution has had on Alan's family.

"I learned by the example of how my parents led their lives," Alan said. "The organizations that have helped us out in the past, I want to give back to them. OHSU was a very important part of my father's medical career, and I wanted to acknowledge that. It played just such an important part in my parents' lives and in my family's lives."

"I was touched and delighted to learn about the scholarship that Alan set up in memory of his parents," said Nathan Selden, M.D., Ph.D., FACS, FAAP, dean of the OHSU School of Medicine and executive vice president of OHSU. "His generosity in supporting future generations of physicians from and for the Pacific Northwest is truly meaningful and appreciated. Scholarships are more important than ever before, especially in supporting students from rural areas and for those choosing to return to rural areas to practice."

Befitting Henry and Grace's passion for and service in rural areas, the Akiyama Family Endowed Scholarship's impact focuses first on medical students from Alan's hometown of Juneau, and it extends outward from there.

Henry grew up in Hood River, Oregon. When he was 14, his family was interned as part of the United States' forced relocation and incarceration of people of Japanese descent during World War II. After internment, Henry enlisted in the U.S. Army and rose to the rank of sergeant in the all-Nisei

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## Akiyama Family Endowed Scholarship continued

442nd Infantry Regiment, a unit made up of almost all second-generation Japanese-Americans and is revered as the most decorated unit in U.S. military history. When he returned, he used the GI Bill to attend Reed College, where he met his wife, Grace.

Henry and Grace married in 1952, and Henry earned his M.D. from what was then called the University of Oregon Medical School five years later in 1957. After completing his residency at St. Vincent Hospital in Portland, Henry and his family moved to Juneau, where Henry began his legendary career.

Grace passed away in 1996. Henry retired from practicing medicine in 2004 and passed away in 2010.


Along with the scholarship for OHSU School of Medicine students, Alan has also established similar scholarships to support students at the University of Alaska Southeast and Reed College, as well as an Akiyama Family Fund to support the Alaska Youth Choir.

“We want to help young people,” Alan said. “Those are the people that are going to shape and mold our communities down the line.”

When Alan began looking into supporting OHSU last summer, he was struck by how much OHSU’s missions aligned with his family’s, especially when it comes to increasing access to educating the next generation of health care providers.

For Alan, there was no better way to honor his father’s legacy than helping support future physicians passionate about rural health.

“I’ve been pleased from what I’ve learned about OHSU,” Alan said. “There’s a shortage of physicians in rural areas throughout the country. And at OHSU, they’re committed to providing the best care they can, the best education they can.”

### **Polish brass candlesticks, cross**

Polish the brass at altar and any other brass items around, such as candlesticks, cross, offering plates.

### **Power thatch yards at church and manse**

We can rent a power thatcher from Don Abel. It helps the lawns a lot if we can get them thatched before the lawn starts growing. Can you help?

### **Power wash parking lot & sidewalks**

Do you have a power washer? Or could you use one that we rent? Could you power wash areas around the church, such as sidewalks, parking lots? We'd like to save the gravel for future use.

### **Take care of potted plants in church**
